

# **Getting Your PR Up to Speed**

or your stories to be relevant you should be constantly talking to new and potential members and thought leaders in your community to identify what they want to know. If you don't know who your potentials are or what they want, then the best your PR can be is a *guess*. If that's the case, you need to reevaluate what you're doing. Everything in the first year is a test, after that you'll have figured out what works.

Doing a community analysis will help you; ask people where they spend their time and what they'd like to know about. Remember, it's more about the **quality** of what you write, **not the quantity**. Make sure any materials you create are framed in the bigger picture of those you wish to reach. Bounce ideas off of potential members and supporters to see what they think. Your release shouldn't be some scary, monolithic pressrelease; it's more a case of making sure what you're doing is interesting. Keep it under 300 words and quote people to make it interesting.

Make sure to contact people who either care about what your club is doing (bloggers, the woman who runs the local church or day care, for example) or have audiences that do (social media followers, website fans, community groups). Speaking to these people will amplify your message quickly and effectively.

Write the article that you'd want a journalist to write for their paper or magazine about your club/club's activity. Once you've got that, you can go to the writers/media before sending it to them and say, "Here's a story that's coming out next week. What do you think?" And take what they say to heart and value it as focused (free) 'consulting.' Remember, when writing anything for the purpose of getting media attention:

Be really, really, really clear, simple and short in what you put together.

**Include three points**. If you can't make those three points really exciting and make them 'pop,' then you need to go back to the drawing board.
